All hazardous materials brought to the landfill on Oct. 4 must be in sturdy boxes and any used oil should be in disposable containers. However, materials should be left in their curately identified.

Don't dump hazardous materials together and if loose or leaking, secure them before transporting them to the landfill. Also, don't carry open containers of liquids with strong orders, especially if they might spill, inside a closed automobile and pack all items so they won't tip, break or spill during the trip.

Bird City woman proposes change in city road name

Carol Brubaker, Bird City resident, was at the Tuesday county commissioners' meeting to talk about having the name changed for the frontage road east of the Tri-State Engine and Thresher Grounds.

Mrs. Brubaker is proposing to have the name of the road be "Tom SawyerRoad." Mr. Sawyer recently died but during his many years in Bird City had been instrumental in establishing the Thresher Showgrounds as well as helping with the show and restoring equipment and machinery.

"We believe that Tom would feel very honored and pleased to have this request granted," Mrs. Brubaker read from a letter submitted by the Sawyer family.

Mrs. Brubaker said she had talked

to the mayor who addressed the city council at the last meeting and the Sawyer family about the road name but thought she needed to come to the commissioners to ask "their blessing." She had also distributed several petitions in the Bird City restaurants which had around 150 signatures.

The commissioners consulted Dave Flemming, county road and bridge supervisor, who informed them that the frontage road was in the city limits but the "Road 29" sign already posted could not be changed because of 911 requirements.

However, Mrs. Brubaker was proposing that the Sawyer road sign be placed below the Road 29 sign.

"I have been encouraged by the way this is bringing a lot of people together to help," Lutters said. "The main thing is 'let's get them here.""

Pickman said the city would be using their work crews and some temporary help to do the demolition work, and that the work was already being started.

Garcia asked if the people from the new company were satisfied that the building would work and if they had seen the building.

Pickman said they were working with the company, and that the city would be providing the building in shape to begin operations as soon as possible. He said the city would pro-

Herndon students to travel to Atwood

By Kimberly Brandt close at the end of this year, with the students traveling to school in Atwood.

At the end of last year the Herndon and Atwood School Districts decided to consolidate into one. At that time the Atwood School Board agreed that the high school in Herndon would stay open for at least a year and the grade school would stay open for at least four years or as long is was economically feasible.

Superintendent Lee Tarrant said at a board meeting in September the board agreed to close the high school in a seven to zero vote.

Mr. Tarrant said they will graduate a large number of kids in Herndon this year with a senior class of 13. There are only three in kindergarten and not a lot of new kids coming into the school system in Herndon.

The grade school, he said has a better shot at staying open for longer, at least the four-year agreement.

The junior high students in Herndon are already going to Atwood for all sports. There will also be a combined high school girls basketball team and track, golf and wrestling will be combined this vear.

Mr. Tarrant took over as the principal in Herndon and is also the transportation director as the district tries to save on some expenses. The past transportation director retired over the summer, he said. Although Mr. Tarrant said he isn't doing the work on the busses, he is working on the routes. Even with the consolidation this is still a small school district. The question is does the district cut a teacher or do you as the superintendent take on more responsibility. Mr. Tarrant said he decided to take on more responsibility.

All of the administrators have chipped in and are doing double and triple times the work.

He said he enjoys going to Herndon. There is a good group of kids there and aren't very many problems.

Mr. Tarrant said a difference from The Herndon High School will last year in Herndon is that there is a full staff this year. The board hired an upper level math teacher which the school didn't have last year. The teacher understands that this is only a one-year contract.

> Even before the decision was made on Monday, Sept. 15, to close the high school after this year, the teachers were pretty sure that it was going to happen, said Mr. Tarrant. They have wanted to make it the best year ever. They have a good attitude and want to get things done. They are a good group all of whom are willing to volunteer to get things done right.

> All of the teachers in Herndon are district employees and some will be able to have jobs in Atwood, but that won't be a great number.

When the two districts consolidated to make one Atwood knew that they could absorb all of the kids from Herndon and none of the teachers. There will be several people, said Mr. Tarrant, who will lose their jobs. He said he has promised if there are jobs open in Atwood that teachers from Herndon can jump into those first before trying to hire someone new.

Mr. Tarrant said since the consolidation they haven't seen a large decrease in the enrollment in Herndon. They lost 10 students, but five of them decided to go to Atwood for school. Overall the district lost a total of 34 students.

He said they knew that decrease was coming.

Consolidation was a good idea for the district, said Mr. Tarrant and most of the people seem very accepting of it. There are exceptions to that and for some people consolidation will be an issue forever.

Although consolidation didn't give the districts more money it stabilized the budget for the next four years

So far, he said everything is going great and consolidation has worked well.
