Player named to college 100th anniversary team

In conjunction with Pittsburg for consideration. State University's centennial celebration, Gorilla football letterwinners have voted and selected a 100th Anniversary football team.

One of the team members chosen was Andy Poling of St. Francis, who played for the Gorillas from 1996 to 1999.

The 33-man team (35 individuals due to ties in balloting) is composed of former Pitt State greats, ranging as far back as Joe Murphy (1932-33) to as recent as Matt Howard (1998-2001).

A total of 129 former Pittsburg State greats were eligible for consideration on the ballot. Any one of three criteria had to be made to be eligible for the ballot: (1) earn National Association Intercollegiate Athletics or National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division II All-America honors; (2) earn induction into the Pittsburg State University Athletics Hall of Fame (as an individual player), (3) be a member of the 50th Anniversary football team which was selected in 1953.

The Pittsburg State University Athletic Department mailed approximately 750 ballots in September to all living football letterwinners that the University had a current mailing address on file. Voting took place through

early October. "We're very excited to recognize this tremendous group of athletes," said associate athletic director Tommy Riggs, who helped coordinate the balloting process. "Each of these former players left an indelible mark on Pitt State football and helped shape the Gorillas' tradition of excellence. Most importantly, this group was selected from among their peers, and the group represents the cream of the crop from more than 1,000 former Pitt State football quad members.

The 100th Anniversary football team includes 32 former All-Americans, 23 members of the University's Athletics Hall of Fame and two members of the 50th Anniversary football team.
