Coats needed for kids

It is that time of year when people are cleaning out their closets and there are undoubtedly some coats and mittens which have not been worn for several years and they need

Connie Jenkins, St. Francis, is once again asking people to open their hearts and closets by giving coats, hats, gloves and mittens to the Urban Peak Teen Shelter in Denver.

Several years ago, Mrs. Jenkins saw homeless teens on the streets without proper clothing. She looked into what she could do for these kids and was told that the Urban Peak Teen Shelter was the only teen shelter in that area and warm clothes were desperately needed. There are counselors, medical assistance and career training for these youth, ages 12 to 20 years old, but many just stop in to get out of the cold.

"Life would have to get pretty rough to opt for the streets," Mrs. Jenkins says.

Wanting to help, year after year, St. Francis people have opened their hearts to these youth.

Since that time, each fall she fills her car with coats and heads for the teen shelter. She plans to make another trip to Denver this year to deliver coats and other warm clothing. "The shelter is most grateful for the warm clothing."

Resident challenges city's letter

Property cleanup, specifically old vehicles, was discussed when the St. Francis City Council met Oct. 21.

Terry Rueb was present to debate a letter recently sent to him concerning health issues with vehicles parked at his Jackson Street residence. The complaint stated that there has been several complaints and/or concerns about the cars.

The cars had been recently parked behind Mr. Rueb's residence and at the time of the notice had been moved to the front of his residence.

Mr. Rueb stated that he had contacted Superintendent Landenberger asking for a list of the complainants and, as of date, had not received a list. Superintendent Landenberger noted that there were no concerns brought to his attention concerning the cars.

The cars have no current registration or tags and therefore fall under the city's definition of "junk vehicles."

Mr. Rueb noted that, in checking with Sherman County Courthouse, state law does not require off-road vehicles to be tagged. Attorney Mike Day explained that city ordinance takes precedence over the offroad vehicles law.

Mr. Rueb questioned as to when

a health inspector had been to his residence, at which point Attorney Day noted that none had at this time.

Mr. Rueb also noted that even though his neighbors had overgrown bushes and a retaining wall that was falling down onto his property, he had not complained.

Mr. Rueb also explained that previously he had the cars stored in garages at a North Scott Street area, but when the property sold he was forced to look elsewhere for housing for the vehicles. He went on to say that although he has found housing for some of the vehicles, he has not found housing for all of the vehicles. Since he has received the letter he has moved the vehicles from view of the street to behind his residence and has assured the council written complaints but that he had members that he will continue to find housing for all of the vehicles.

The hospital board and administration are actively seeking donations for the project which brings donors the reward of 70 percent Kansas Income Tax credits but a lot more work needs to be done. Administrator Lacy is quick to point out that Robert Van Allen has been making contacts to help the project along.

Administrator Lacy believes the hospital's goals can be reached by making a sufficient number of contacts both locally and out-oftown. He points out that the drought has been a huge factor in the ability of county residents to participate. At the same time, he believes that if people will participate even at the minimum \$250 level (he is quick to add that more would be better), the goal is attain-

"This project is critical and these tax credits are too good of a deal. Failure is not an option!" Administrator Lacy said.

The project was originally supposed to include erecting a drivethrough ambulance entrance on the rear of the old facility. However, when the bids came in, they were higher than the architect's estimates so the new ambulance entrance was put on hold and it is possible that the project will be done with either grant funding or state sales tax dollars in the future.
