Lillus Ruth Poulignot Mace

Oct. 8, 1917 - Feb. 13, 2004

Lillus Ruth Poulignot was born on Oct. 8, 1917, in McDonald, Kan. Her parents were Elie Samuel Poulignot and Olive Thomas. She died on Feb. 13, 2004, in Kiowa at the age of 86.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, Feb. 17, at Anderson-Burris Funeral Home in Enid, Okla. Reverends Alan Mac and John McLemore officiated. A private burial will be held later at the Amorita-Byron Community Cemetery in Amorita, Okla.

Mrs. Mace was raised in Cheyenne County, Scott City, Woodward, Okla., and St. Francis. She graduated from Cheyenne County High School in St. Francis in 1934. After a course of Normal Teacher Training, she began to teach in the Cheyenne County School System. She did additional training at Fort Hays State Teachers' College (now Fort Hays State University) in Hays.

On Dec. 3, 1943, she married Roby Clyde Mace, then serving in the United States Army Air Corp. Following their marriage in Goodland, he was sent to the European Theater for the remainder of World War II. Mrs. Mace moved to the New York City area where she was a supervisor with the War Department.

In 1945, the Maces returned to St. Francis and in 1951, they moved to the Oklahoma City area. Over the years, Mrs. Mace served as a Cub Scout and Girl Scout leader, active school volunteer, and church worker both congregationally and at a district level. For several years, she managed a cafeteria in Warr Acres, Okla. For many years prior to her retirement in 1981, she was the secretary for the Putnam City Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Oklahoma City.

Following her husband's retirement in 1983, the Maces moved to Enid. Here she was active in Senior Ambucs, the Central Christian Church, the Sooner Sunday School class, and helped to begin the Caregivers Ministry program of Central Christian Church. On Dec. 3, 2003, she and her late husband celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary.

Mrs. Mace was preceded in death by her husband, Roby, on Dec. 8, 2003; and three brothers: George Emmanuel Poulignot, Elie Samuel Poulignot Jr., and Thomas Poulignot.

She is survived by three children, Alan Mace and wife, Janice, of Wilson, N.C., Marilyn Morford and

husband, Jim, of Amorita and Phyllis Maupin and fiancée, James Wright, of Enid. In addition she is survived by eight grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren: Anne-Marie Mankin, her husband, Kevin, and sons, Justin, Cory and Matthew of Earlham, Iowa; Christina Gentle and her children, Christa and Mark of Tullahoma, Tenn.; Kathy Neely and her husband, Joe, and their children, Joseph and Megan of Burlington, Okla.; Michael Morford and wife, Joyti, of Austin, Texas; Susan Morford of Fort Lauderdale, Fla.; James Morford of Amorita; Mark Maupin and wife, Hiromi, of Chicago; and Christopher Maupin of Edmond, Okla.

Meat market adds more items; takes over donuts

P & L Ideal Meat Market will be carrying more grocery items and, as of Tuesday, are now selling Daylight Donuts.

Les Doggett, owner/manager, along with co-owner Pete Jensen, reported that the shop will be carrying more grocery items as a convenience to customers who have come in to purchase meat.

"We are adding a few canned goods and staples — things that go with meats," said Mr. Doggett. "We are offering convenience for our customers."

P & L Ideal Meat Market carries beef, pork, chicken and fish. They also specialize in German sausage, bratwurst, Italian sausage and new are the pork and bacon patties.

"We also have many special orders of bundles and larger quantities of patties, steaks and roasts," Mr. Doggett said.

In the past, the Market has carried milk, bread and condiments but they are now adding canned goods, paper products, spices, hamburger helpers, macaroni and cheese and spaghetti, just to name a few.

On Tuesday, Mr. Doggett and Tiffany Jensen will start selling Daylight Donuts. The donuts are made in Atwood and brought to St. Francis via the Salina Journal carrier. The Market will have a variety of donuts and rolls which people can pick up. In couple of weeks, they plan to be able to sell coffee, but they won't have a place for people to sit while they enjoy their

donuts.

"We do not have the facility for customers eating in — we will just have carryout. However, we are now selling milk and juices," Mr. Doggett said.

Those needing large orders of rolls and/or donuts should give the Market a call a day or two in advance as not only those at the Market would appreciate the notice, but those making the donuts would also like to know.

The Market is open from 7 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Mondays through Fridays and from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays.

Everyone is encouraged to stop by and buy some donuts or rolls and pick up their meat supply for the week.
