Teachers to receive pay for advancing on salary schedule

At an earlier meeting, the school board took action to freeze all salaries for the present school year at last year's level but, at the Monday meeting of the St. Francis Board of Education, the board agreed to lift the freeze so teachers could be paid for advancing a year on the salary schedule.

Teachers have not received pay for advancing a year on the salary schedule, however, the superintendent noted that pay for earning additional college hours had been Superintendent Werner said the

schedule. Superintendent Werner said this would, in most cases, amount to an increase of \$460 or approximately \$10,000. 'It is not really a raise — just allowing them (teachers) to move to the right steps on the salary
