Loans available for farm stored crops

forfeited

Bill Fuller, state executive director of the U.S. Farm Service Agency announced recently that producers who still have beneficial interest in their 2003-crop wheat, oats, barley and honey can still obtain a commodity loan until March 31.

"Nine-month loans are available for farm-stored or warehouse stored 2003 commodities," said Director Fuller. "Loans obtained in March will be at the 2.25 percent interest rate. Farm-stored commodities must be in approved structures that meet the Kansas Farm-Stored Loan Policies. A copy of these policies can be obtained at your local Farm Service Agency office."

Non-recourse commodity loans can be repaid anytime during the 9-,month loan period at principal plus interest or at the Farm Service Agency Posted County Price, or the loan collateral can be forfeited to the Commodity Credit Corporation Agency office at your local U.S. for settlement of the loan amount. Recourse loans must be repaid at principal plus interest and cannot be

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March 20-27.

March 31 is also the final date to request a Loan Deficiency Payment on 2003-crop wheat, oats, barley and honey. However, the market price of these commodities has been higher than the Farm Service Agency Posted County Price, and therefore a Loan Deficiency Payment rate has not been applicable. Producers must still have beneficial interest in the commodity to obtain

a loan or Loan Deficiency Payment. To date, Kansas Farm Service Agency offices have issued 3,411 commodity loans for \$116,662,777 and 63,365 Loan Deficiency Payment's for \$52,911,130 to producers of 2003 commodities.

The final date to request a commodity loan or Loan Deficiency Payment for 2003-crop feed grains, oilseeds and cotton is June 1, 2004.
