had applied and been given a 50-50 Kansas State Forestry Grant to purchase five sets of bunker gear for firemen. This year, the Forestry Grant is again available and more bunker gear is needed. However, Coordinator Hobrock attended a Federal Emergency Management Agency grant workshop and found the bunker gear would qualify for a 90-10 matching grant. If the county were to qualify for the Federal Emergency Management Agency grant, all of the needed bunker gear could be purchased this year for less money than spent last year for five

The commissioners agreed that applications should be submitted for both the Kansas State Forestry and Federal Emergency Management Agency grants and, if the Federal Emergency Management Agency grant is awarded, the firemen could turn down the Forestry grant.

Chief Harper also reported that the firemen's pagers were about 14 years old and some were not working well. He asked permission to get bids for pagers to be purchased with

work with Gary Rogers, county emergency manager. The commissioners said to get the bids and report back at a future meeting.

Chief Harper said the department now has release forms for those in the county wanting buildings burned down. The forms will need to be signed by the owner of the buildings before the firemen are allowed to burn

Computer for judge

Jolene Dodd, new District Magistrate Judge, reported that there were no computer programs on the computer in her office. She had consulted Infinitec, an internet company which the clerk of the court's computer is connected, and the technician informed her that the processing speed would not accept the needed soft-

The commissioners questioned where the software for the computer was. Judge Dodd said she did not know. Commissioner Krien noted that the software was county property and maybe the county attorney needed to look into the matter.

In the meantime, the judge needs a computer and the commissioners 911 funds. He reported that he will agreed to purchase a Dell unit for

\$1,710 which included basic software and would allow her to use state programs. Internet was also discussed but no decisions were made.

The commissioners agreed that the judge needed to go through the inventory list of items in that office and see what is there and what might be miss-

Several major country roads were mentioned but it was noted that "main artery" roads needed more definition.

Commissioner Raile said that, overall, the county crew had gained a lot on the conditions of roads.

- An ambulance service plan and licenses were signed.
- Commissioners Tim Raile and Jane Brubaker, along with Dave Flemming, Terry Miller, Mary Morrow, Sharon Elliott, Gary Rogers and Dolores Jenik will be among those attending the "Little" Kansas Association of Counties meeting.
- Mary Morrow, register of deeds, was given permission to attend a meeting in Colby. After explaining that sometimes people mail too much money for services at the register of deeds office, the commissioners allowed her to put that money, if it is \$5 or less, into the copy fund; over \$5 will be mailed back to the sender.
- Seven people from the High Plains Mental Health came to explain data they had sent earlier and explain the services of the organization.
