Darrel Eugene Nelsen

Darrel Eugene Nelsen, 57, was born Oct. 11, 1946, in St. Francis, Kan., to Harold and Annabelle Nelsen. He grew up on the family farm 10 miles south of Bird City. Darrel had three younger brothers, David, Doyle and Dwayne. Darrel was a member of the Bird City United Methodist Church.

After graduation from Bird City High School, Darrel enlisted in the Air Force and served during the Vietnam War. He was stationed at non Ambrosier, Eldon Walden, Sheppard Air Force Base and served as an instructor in power production. Darrel was then stationed in Germany for the duration of the war.

Darrel enjoyed hunting, fishing, working in his shop, and coming up with brilliant little inventions. He enjoyed the Antique Engine Thresher Show and taking the Steam Engine to the Cheyenne County Fair to steam the roasting ears of corn for the community picnic.

Survivors include his mother, fa-

ther, brothers and their families, daughters, Janessa Nelsen of Hays, Jessica Nelsen of St. Francis, Erika Dunn of Oklahoma City and her children Alexis and Caleb. On March 10, 2004, Darrel died

in Bird City.
