Not only do they have a responsibility but it is an important responsibility — a responsibility that can have an impact on the people.

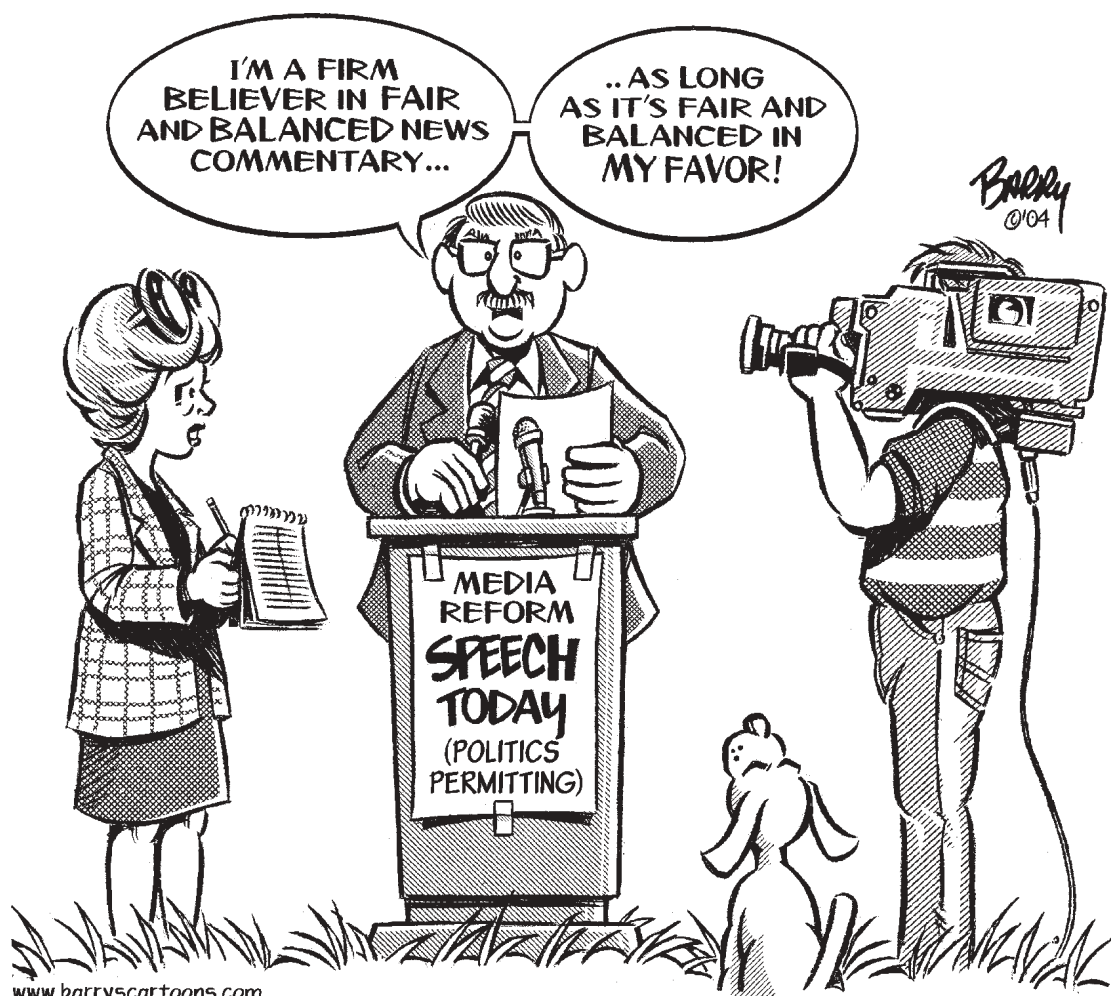
Now, after voting (you can do it ahead of time in the advanced voting booth at the clerk's office in the courthouse), it is time to head out and support the Cheyenne County Fair.
