School board cuts one bus route

The number of bus routes picking up St. Francis students was cut from six to five regular routes when the St. Francis Board of Education met on Thursday evening. There will still be one noon kindergarten route which is the same number as last The administration and bus ga-

rage manager had gone over the routes during the summer and, with the resignation of Pat Confer, had decided to combine the routes. The route which Connie Williams had driven last year was combined with two other routes and Mrs. Williams assumed the route driven by Mrs. As the board reviewed the maps

of the different bus routes, there was discussion of those students who might not ride all the time. The students are enrolled.

It was noted that the decline in

enrollment was showing up in the number of bus routes needed. By combining the routes and doing away with one route, the school district will save between \$10,000 and


