Indians beat Rawlins County, win District

For many high school football teams, the season is over, but the St. Francis Indians earned the District 13 title with a 43-6 win Thursday evening. They finished District play with a 3-0 record. The final victim of the St. Francis regular season effort was the Rawlins County Buffaloes. Previously St. Francis had defeated the other two District teams, Syracuse and Leoti/Wichita County. The District win moved St. Francis into Bi-District play (see story elsewhere).

From now on every game involves the losing team being eliminated from further competition and the winning team moving on toward the State title.

Against Rawlins County, Sainty rushed for 400 yards and passed for 57 yards to earn the lopsided victory. Again St. Francis used speed in the backfield to make large break-away gains following good blocking. The Indians could not collect their fifth shutout when Atwood scored with 4 second re-


