## Pheasant season opens Saturday

The opening of pheasant season begins one-half hour before sunset on Saturday and, as usual, many hunters from other areas of Kansas as well as other states will be arriving in Cheyenne County on Friday so they will be able to hit the fields early in the morning.

Pheasant numbers in northwest Kansas are up a little this year although those numbers haven't taken a huge leap.

Small Game Biologist Randy Rogers, with the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, said there had been a modest improvement in bird numbers for this area.

Last year, he said, there was a significant gain in the pheasant population. Even with increases the last two years, though, the numbers aren't anywhere close to where they were before northwest Kansas entered a drought in 1999.

Mr. Rogers said the problem has been that the ideal breeding season hasn't been put together yet. This year and in 2003, the weather helped the population grow.

In 2003, Mr. Rogers said there was an ideal spring which allowed for a good wheat crop which created good nesting conditions. The good nesting conditions, or the amount of wheat stubble, carried the birds through a dry, hot summer.

This year, the area stayed dry all winter and continued through the spring, resulting in a poor wheat crop.

Mr. Rogers said in May and into early June, he was worried because the conditions were terrible, but then the area started to pick up some nice rains and temperatures were moderate through the summer. The lower temps saved the birds.

# Former Saintry graduate, wrestler recognized

A former St. Francis resident has been selected to the Wrestling Hall of Fame and he will be recognized permanently at the National Wrestling Hall of Fame and Museum in Stillwater, Okla.

Lyle Neville, Hutchinson, has been notified that he will be honored for a lifetime of service to wrestling at the Hall of Fame Day banquet on Nov. 7 in Wichita. He among those honored and recognized for their years of commitment as positive role models to Kansas student athletes.

Mr. Neville, along with Lawrence Alley, the late Antoine Bontz, Thomas Faust, Gus Garcia, C. Dee Gard, the late Francis Hagan, C. Duwane Miller and Bill Stanhope, will also be permanently recognized at the National Wrestling Hall of Fame and Museum at Stillwater, Okla.

Mr. Neville was born in rural Cheyenne County and attended a rural school for the first eight years of his education. He then went to St. Francis Community High School where he lettered in football, wrestling and track. During his high school wrestling career, he won first at regionals and third at state his freshman year. As a sophomore, he earned first place at the district tournament, first at regionals and first at state. He pinned all of his opponents at the state tournament.

His junior year, he placed first at district, first at regional and first at state. His senior year, he placed first at district, first at regionals and first at state.

Mr. Neville said that after his freshman year, he lost only one match the next three years.

From 1951 through 1955, St. Francis Community High School won the state wrestling team championship. Warren Boring was Mr. Neville's coach for 1951-52 and 1952-53; Maynard Skinner coached in 1953-54 and 1954-55.

Following graduation from high school, Mr. Neville went on to the University of Colorado, Boulder, where he graduated. While there, he

participated in varsity wrestling, lettering his sophomore, junior and senior years. (Freshmen were not eligible to participate at the college level.)

However, as a freshman, he won first place in two Rocky Mountain Amateur Athletic Union wrestling tournaments, participated in the Regional Olympic Trials for 1956 Olympics where he won first place and was awarded a trophy for the fastest fall of the tournament (10 seconds). He also participated in freestyle and Greco Roman Olympic trails in Los Angeles.

His sophomore year, he won first place in Rocky Mountain Amateur Athletic Union wrestling tournament; and won first place at the Big Seven Wrestling Tournament at 137 pounds. At the Big Seven Tournament, he defeated the returning champion 7-2, to win the championship.

During his senior year, he won all of his duals except three. He placed fourth in the Big Eight Wrestling Tournament at 137 pounds.

He said this was the toughest tournament of his life. The first, second and third place finishers at his weight finished first, second and third in a different order two weeks later at the national tournament. He said he lost the third-fourth place match to Shelby Wilson of Oklahoma State by a 3-2 score. Wilson was the 137-pound national champ in 1959 and was the gold medal winner in the 1960 Olympics.

## Career

Mr. Neville began his coaching career at Sterling High School in Sterling, Colo. He said his first coaching exposure was one of the more devastating of his career.

"As a first-year eager coach, I had really taken that group of young men through a rigid pre-season training program in preparation for our first dual meet at Sidney, Neb." he said. "We traveled to Sidney and halfway through the matches at intermission, we had won all six of the matches. After intermission, we lost the next six matches, losing the

dual by two points.

"What a way to start a 36-year career!"

He said he then moved to Colby where he coached 10 years in the "tough northwest Kansas hotbed of Kansas Wrestling."

"I enjoyed those years I spent in Colby," he said. "A blending of small community unity and hard working ethics in the athletes that I worked with combined for a memorable time in my life."

In June, 1970, he and his family moved to Hutchinson where he finished his coaching and teaching career. While in Hutchinson, he was able to coach his three sons in the sport of wrestling and one son won a first and second place in state competition and another placed fourth at state. His daughter was a wrestling cheerleader.

Mr. Neville's team won two state wrestling championships (1973 and 1981).

"I have coached many fine young men in my coaching career. I would like to recognize two of the most noted wrestlers I have been privileged to coach: Steve Lampe at Colby High School, who was a three-time state champion; and Jim

Coons, who was a three-time state champion at Hutchinson High School.

During his coaching career, besides two championship teams, Mr. Neville coached three teams to second-place finishes; coached two teams to third-place finishes; coached 25 individual state champions; and coached 63 additional place winners at state tournament.

In 1978, he was named the 5-A Wrestling Coach of the Year by the Kansas Wrestling Coaches Of America and in 1981, was the 6-A Wrestling Coach of the Year.

In 1987, he received a certificate of appreciation for 20 years of service and dedication and contribution to the sport of wrestling from the Kansas Wrestling Coaches Association and, in 1992-93, received Coach of the Year for Wrestling from the Kansas Coaches Association.

He was inducted into the Kansas Wrestling Coaches Hall of Fame and nominated as a coach and wrestler.

## Today

Mr. Neville and his wife Bonnie will have been married 43 years in July. They have three sons, Brad, Lane, and Morgan; a daughter



Monee and four grandchildren.

In reflecting back on the past 50 years of his life, Mr. Neville said he felt blessed for the opportunity to have participated in so many activities, especially the sport of wres-

ting, both as a participant and as a coach....and working with and being a part of the development of hundreds of young people's lives over the last 40 years.

"It has been a great life!" he said.

However, pheasant numbers in northwest Kansas are still lagging way behind what people were expecting. Mr. Rodgers said there had been some growth.

The quail population is up but Mr. Rodgers said it isn't anything to get excited about because the area isn't noted for large numbers of quail.

Hunters need to remember that it is important to get permission from landowners, hunt safely and wear orange.

### Hunting licenses

Hunters can purchase licenses at

Majestic Service, the clerk's office at the courthouse and at K-Store in St. Francis.

### Bag limit/method of take

Hunters need to remember that the daily bag limit is four cocks and pheasants in possession for transportation must retain intact a foot, plumage or some part that will determine the sex.

Pheasant hunters may use shotguns and muzzleloading shotguns no larger than 10 gauge with shot only as a method of take. Other methods of take include bow and arrow and falconry.
