Youth center opens to younger crowd

A frequent complaint in "Small Town, USA" among teenagers is that there is "No place to go." That changed in St. Francis in August with the opening of Zero's youth center. The brainchild of Kary Zweygardt, Zero's opened last August at 218 W. Washington, the previous location of The Artist Corner.

"When we closed out the gallery and gifts and moved my custom framing business to the little church building at 200 W. Jackson, we needed to come up with something to fill the building. We looked for something that would fill a need, not just fill the space," Mr. Zweygardt said. "I've worked with kids for years through the summer baseball league, through church and school activities, so that is where my heart is. I wanted to do something for them, give them some place to hang out. After discussing it with my wife, we came up with Zero's.'

Zero's offers a snack bar with

'And for the health conscious, we offer juice and granola bars, too," he said.

There are giant chalk boards to graffition, board games available, as well as arcade games, and ping pong, pool and foos ball played by the half hour. The Zero's decorating scheme is "retro" with bright chrome dinettes, and a fuzzy brown couch and chair in the lounge area.

Zero's is open Tuesday through Thursday from 4 to 7 p.m., on Friday from 4 to 10 p.m. and on Saturday from 1 to 10 p.m. There are afterschool snack specials and free ping pong, pool and foos ball after the movie on Saturday night. Zero's is also available for private parties.

'Our hours are flexible" Mr. Zweygardt said. "If the place is full of kids having a good time at closing, we'll stay open later for them, like the night we had a spontaneous ping pong

championship going until 11:30 p.m. I want them to know this is their place "We have been overwhelmed by

the outpouring of support by the community and the response of the kids. We have been given donations that helped us get open, including a pool table from Pastor Rich Garcia. Lanny DeGood donated a ping pong table and Don Keeker gave a foos ball table. We were looking to buy a good used refrigerator and had talked to Mary Bier. The next thing we knew, she called with one to donate to us. We've also had many, many offers of people volunteering their time or service just to help the kids. It has been wonderful.

"And the kids have been great. Business waxes and wanes with what is going on at school, but sometimes we have 25 kids in here at once. They have been really good about following the guidelines we posted: No bad language, no bullying, etc. We are putting together a board made up of kids that will help set the rules as well as decide how to handle situations that arise when kids don't follow the rules. 2020.

And the name?

"People always ask us where the name came from. My wife and I had discussed that sometimes kids feel they don't matter, that they are "losers" even when they put up a confident front. Our whole purpose was to have a place just for them and we wanted everything to reflect that. We were looking for a name, it was late at night and we were tired from working to get Zero's opened and we started joking about possible names. Maybe it was a chocolate attack, but we started throwing out names of candy bars like Snickers, or Baby Ruth and Kim said, 'Zero's!' We both just stopped and said, 'That's it!' It reflects what we wanted to say to the kids, 'Sometimes, you may feel like a'zero,' that you don't matter, but you do. God made everyone to be somebody
