The third most responses were in the restaurant and food services category. Several responses suggested a bakery and sandwich shop on Main Street. Other responses also indicated a new restaurant should be on Main rant responses are included in one Street. The generic fast food restaurant or a Subway on Main Street had the most responses. Applebee's was specifically named, as were Quizno's, and Long John Silver's. A need for a recreation place for the whole family with a restaurant was indicated. A caterer and a bed and breakfast were also suggested.

A few suggested a shuttle service to Denver International Airport. Three responses suggested a second grocery store with the produce section emphasized. Other suggestions were: western factory outlet, farm service store such as Orscheln's, dry cleaners/laundromat, a wind farm, optometrist, obstetrician/gynecologist, a dairy and a GMC dealership.

Some of the comments added to the questionnaires were that the community needed to clean up and to provide easy accessibility to businesses. Other comments were: "We need any kind of business." The business community needs to disregard "imaginary obstacles."
