CAT scanner installed and already being used

The CAT scanner has been installed at the Cheyenne County Hospital and the board was told on Tuesday, Nov. 23, that the scanner has already shown 60 percent more usage than what had been budgeted.

Also now in use is the computerized radiology equipment and the X-ray equipment.

When the new addition was built on the hospital, the old part of the facility was remodeled, putting the X-ray equipment next to the emergency room, the operating room and the business office/ waiting room. The remodeling had started when the plans turned a sharp corner and the board agreed to have a CAT scanner in-

"It is some of the best equipment in the area," the tech said.

"We waited to make sure the volume (number of patients) was here to support the financial model," Administrator Lacy said.

The equipment was purchased on a lease agreement and the savings on film, ambulance runs to other hospitals having the equipment and the rental of the truck which came to St. Francis to do scans will more than cover the lease costs.

The X-ray equipment can be raised and lowered so the patient can easily get on or be moved on. The table top can then be repositioned under the X-ray tube without moving the patient to get the X-ray with as little discomfort as possible to the patient.
