He was born March 30, 1916, on his family's farm in Dundy County to Roy A. and Jenny (Roberts) Ham and attended country school near his home. He went on to attend Benkelman High School where he was a member of the graduating class of 1934.

On Nov. 2, 1941, Stan was united in marriage to Thelma A. Mann at Benkelman. They made their home in Benkelman until 1942, when they moved to California for a short time. After returning to Benkelman, Stan farmed for several years, and in 1947, he purchased Four-Corners Service Station in Benkelman, and later Stanley's Oil Company. In later years, the name of the company was changed to Valley Farm, Inc., a company that is still owned and operated by his family.
