Recycling organization exceed goal of 500 tons

The Northwest Kansas Regional Recycling Organization of which Cheyenne County is a member, recently announced exceeding their goal to collect 500 tons of recyclable municipal solid waste.

At the close of 2004, the Organization had marketed 1,036,860 pounds or 518.4 tons of materials to be recycled into new products. The amount collected exceeds these figures aa the regional collection facility as well as two of the satellite center are still holding materials collected during 2004 for shipment.

In addition to exceeding its goal, the organization received \$36,393 for the materials sold. The proceeds from the sales are used to employ a part-time person at the regional facility in Colby, equipment purchases and upkeep, purchase materials for public education, general operations and travel expenses for workshops and training needs.

The St. Francis Recycling Center is limited to certain recyclable items they can take. All items brought to the Center should be sorted accordingly, bottles and containers rinsed and all caps removed. When possible, flatten the container.

Items not accepted at the Center are motor oil containers, paint newspaper including the inserts or aerosol cans, glass dishes, window glass and light bulbs,
