Group to meeting Sunday

The High Plains Archaeology Group will meet at 2 p.m. on Sunday, March 13, at the Pioneer Memorial Library in Colby.

President Nancy Arendt will discuss the upcoming Kansas Archaeology Training Program, which will be near Kanorado in June.

No archaeology experience is necessary to participate in the field school, which is at a site that has prehistoric mammoth and camel bones along with evidence of man.

"This could be the excavation of a lifetime," Ms. Arendt said. "It is possibly the oldest evidence of humans in North America."

Cost to attend the 16 day dig is \$20 for Kansas Anthropological Association members.

Cost for an individual Kansas Anthropological Association membership is \$20 annually. Family and student memberships are available. For those who are not association members, cost to attend the dig is

"Participation can be as little as one day or all 16 days for the onetime fee of \$20," Ms. Arendt said. "You choose your schedule. You can even come and go in nonconsecutive days."
