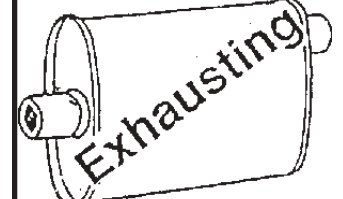

New signs project discussed during Historical meeting

The new signs that Tobe Zwegardt and Milton Lampe made were among the projects discussed at the March 8 meeting of the Historical Society. Helene Landenberger has just about finished painting the words on them and they will put up next week. The signs will advertise the Cheyenne County Museum, Arickaree Breaks and the River Walk. All signs will have "birthplace of Ron Evans" at the bottom. The family gave permission and the sign on west U.S. 36 will be located on the Feikert land. There will be a sign placed on U.S. 36 on the east side when an agreement is made with a landowner.

Luanne Isernhagen will head the project for historical homes in St. Francis. Donna Northrup and Wanda Gienger will be helping her.

Dee Dorsch is going to be the chairperson for the history on quilts. Mrs. Dorsch showed the form that the information will be gathered on and a committee meeting was set for March 31 at the Museum.

Mrs. Dorsch also asked if the Museum would be a site for the Thresher Books that were written this past year. The books will sell for \$32 plus tax, or if ordered by mail they will be \$35. The book has many pictures and information on the Tri-State Antique Engine and Thresher Show which is held each year in Bird City.

After some discussion about the bills that are not being paid in a timely manner, it was moved and seconded that there will be a third signer for the checks. The checks will still only require two signatures, but any two of the three people will be able to sign them.

Mrs. Dorsch shared information about the Kanorado Dig which will be held this summer by an archaeological group.

Milton and Betty Lampe are working on a 20-year history board of the society that will be displayed at the Museum. They also have on display a Family Generation Chart for the Lampe family which both of them have worked on.

The Pendergraf cassette tapes were brought up again at this meeting. They have been missing out of the drawer for about two months now. Mr. Zwegardt stated that if they were not in the drawer by next month's meeting we will have to do some serious investigation on it.

President Margaret Bucholtz stated that she will be working at the Museum at least two days a week during the summer months. This will help to get more projects completed and allow days for people to have access to the museum.

An intermission was called by the president and everyone was invited

A CHARTER ORDINANCE REPEALING CHARTER ORDINANCE NO. 02-01 EXEMPTING THE CITY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS, FROM THE PROVISIONS OF K.S.A. 15-106.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS:

Section 1. Repeal. The City of Bird City, Kansas, by virtue of the power vested in it by Article 12, Section 5 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, hereby elects to and does repeal the enactment of Charter Ordinance No. 02-01 and upon the effective date of this charter ordinance, K.S.A. 15-106, and amendments thereto, shall apply and be in full force and effect.

Section 2. Publication. This Charter Ordinance shall be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in the official city newspaper.

Section 3. Effective Date. This Charter Ordinance shall take effect 61 days after final publication unless a sufficient petition for a referendum is filed, requiring a referendum to be held on the ordinance as provided an Article 12, Section 5 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, in which case this Charter Ordinance shall become effective upon approval by a majority of the electors voting thereon.
