Court OKs the seizure of private property

That statement was written by the chief counsel for the American Family Association Center for Law and Policy, a constitutional litigation firm, after the U.S. Supreme Court on Thursday, ruled that it was OK for a Connecticut local government to seize private homes to use in the private development of an



When it is time to vote, don't just mark the "yes" box for the judges or legislators. With judges taking more and more power, maybe it is time to study just what these judges stand for, some of the cases they have handled and decisions they have made before making that —Karen Krien
