# Public hearing for fire truck decision has few attending

The public hearing concerning the fire truck grant was held at 9 a.m. during the Cheyenne County Commissioners' meeting on Friday. Only a handful of people including Don Spangler, representative of Weis Fire and Safety, were in the room when the hearing was held.

The hearing was held as a recommendation by the grant administrator Amy Griffey because the fire chief George Harper was an employee of Yost Farm Supply. The Hay Fire Equipment company, in its bid, noted that it had planned to purchase the trucks from Yost Ford-Mercury. Even though the Yost company that Mr. Harper works for is a separate company from Yost Ford-Mercury, Ms. Griffey said it was important that the hearing be held so everyone could voice their opinions. There were no complaints

Another reason for the hearing was the fact that the commissioners, after hearing the firemen's concern, had not taken the low bid of \$263,205 from Weis Fire and Safety, Salina, choosing instead, the bid from Hays Fire for

firemen. One of the main problems the firemen had with the chassis was the skid. The firemen wanted aluminum. Weis said their method of construction was to use a steel skid which allows for a lifetime tank warranty.

At one of the meetings, Mr. Spangler said the company could provide aluminum or could put aluminum over the steel. The Hays company representative said if aluminum was applied over the steel, an electrolysis would occur because two types of metal were being put together. It would eventually weaken the frame.

In the Weis letter, Mr. Weis stated that they can put a 1/4 thick rubber isolation pad between the two metals. Also, they had a 10year warranty covering corrosion and structural components. Besides discussing the valves used, he said again, that Weis Fire had never sued Hays Fire Equipment and the Hays company had never sued Weis.

In the Hays Fire Equipment letter, Clayton Meyers talked about the chassis and how they solicit bids. The letter said that they solicit bids from local area vendors in the area where the trucks are placed. They will select the best value to meet the needs of the fire department.
