

The sound of the steam engine whistle on Thursday, July 28, will mark the start of the 52nd Tri-State Antique Engine and Thresher Show in Bird City.

People come from near and far to attend the four-day event which features the ways of the "good ole" days." Eggers Building

In the Eggers Building, rooms are set up to look like they did in the late 1800s and early 1900s. There is a kitchen, parlor, wash room and a bedroom. Maynard Wright's player piano is on display and sometimes can be heard playing those delightful tunes. Collections are displayed and demonstrations can be watched much of the show.

The Tri-State Antique Engine and Thresher Showgrounds are bustling with activity as preparations continue for opening day on Wednesday, July 27. The steam engines are being primed for their place in the spotlight as the tractors psych themselves up for the anticipated tractor pull.

Amidst all the commotion and routine chores, association members take time to remember the shows of the past and the fond memories they create.

Delbert Powell, retired association member, began working with show in the mid 1980s after Gerald Wright invited him to ride with him to Wichita to attend a steam boiler safety meeting.

"It was so difficult for the women to carry everything out there. The men said that they work for us all year, the least we could do is work for them for three days," she said with a laugh. "That was about the time they decided to move it to town."

Whether the show runs smoothly or with a few snags, most members and guests accept everything with a good sense of humor. Although the getting ready and cleaning up parts of the show aren't their favorite jobs, everyone looks forward to visiting the folks that come to Bird City every

"They always have lots of stories to tell," said Mr. Henry.

"They've improved it (the show) so much," added Mrs. Seymore. "They have so many interesting things. I especially enjoy the quilts.'


