
For some children the beginning of another school year also means starting classes in a new school because of a family move. Moving to a new community can be especially hard on children, and even more so if accompanied by other significant changes such as death, divorce or remarriage. Not only does a child need to adjust to a new home and neighborhood, they also have to deal with a new school schedule and different classes. Even thinking about these changes and stressed. In addition, making new friends and becoming part of a new peer group can be even more anxiety provoking.
