A. The uneven distribution of vaccine throughout Kansas (and the U.S.) occurs for the following rea-

-Flu vaccine is delivered in batches; therefore, doses are shipped out as they are developed over the course of several weeks, as is done nearly every year. Shipments nationwide are expected to continue into December.

-Manufacturers typically fill large orders first, which means doctors' offices and health departments may get their orders later than larger corporations, such as drug store or grocery chains, that placed vaccine
