Timing is important for nitrogen applications to late wheat

By: Jeanne Falk K-State Agronomist Producers who have planted wheat late, directly into row crop stubble or residue, must decide when and how to apply nitrogen. The best approach is to apply as much of the crop's total nitrogen requirements as possible below the soil surface at or before planting time, according to Dale Leikam, K-State nutrient management specialist. While urea N vitalization is not a big concern for winter wheat production systems, applying nitrogen below the soil surface eliminates any potential for volitization and minimizes immobilization of the applied nitrogen in the previous crop is residue.

For those who applied no fertilizer at planting time, or only a on sandier soil, where leaching

the question is whether to apply the nitrogen fertilizer in the fall or to delay the application until early spring. The timing decision is important primarily to dryland or flood-irrigated wheat. Nitrogen can be applied to pivot-irrigated wheat any time it's warm enough to run the sprinklers.

In general, on medium- to finetextured soils, the best approach is to topdress the wheat as soon as possible after the wheat has tillered. This provides the maximum opportunity for the nitrogen to move into the root zone with precipitation. It also improves the chances of the wheat taking in the nitrogen at an early enough growth stage to help maximize yield potential. For wheat grown
