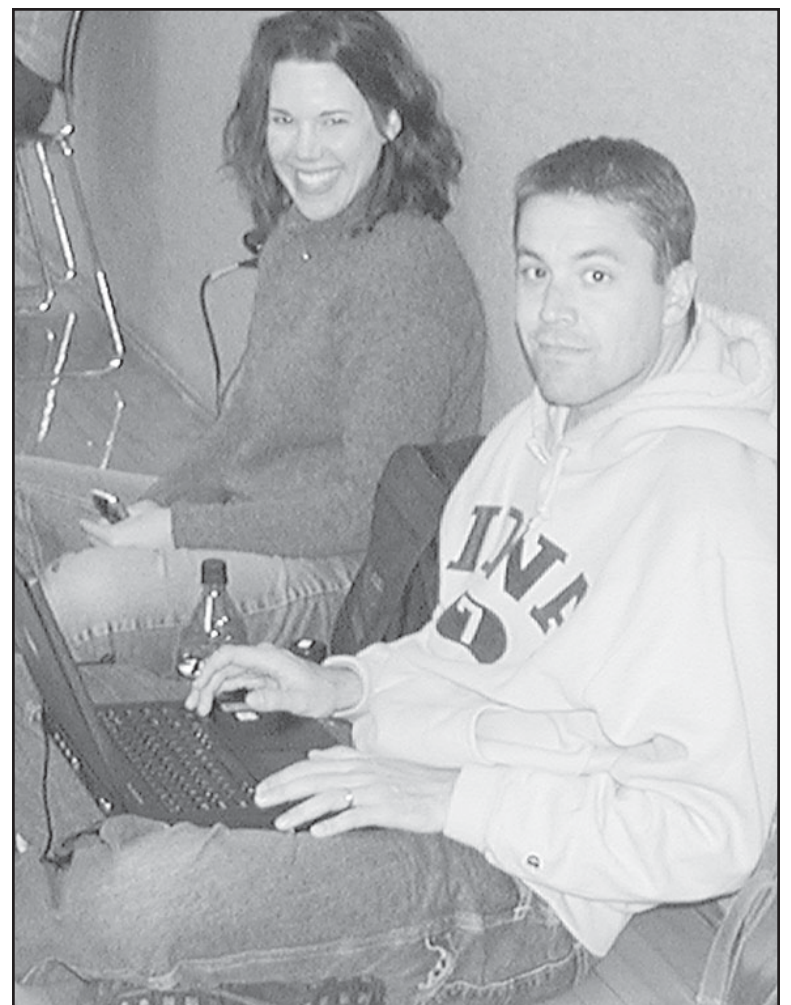
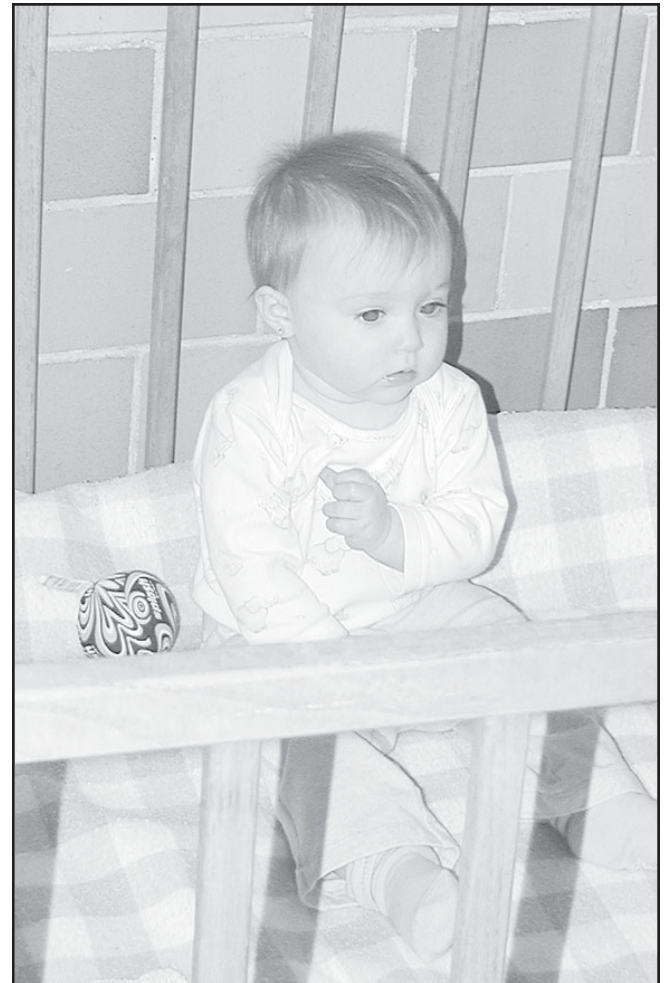


# Snow storm strands

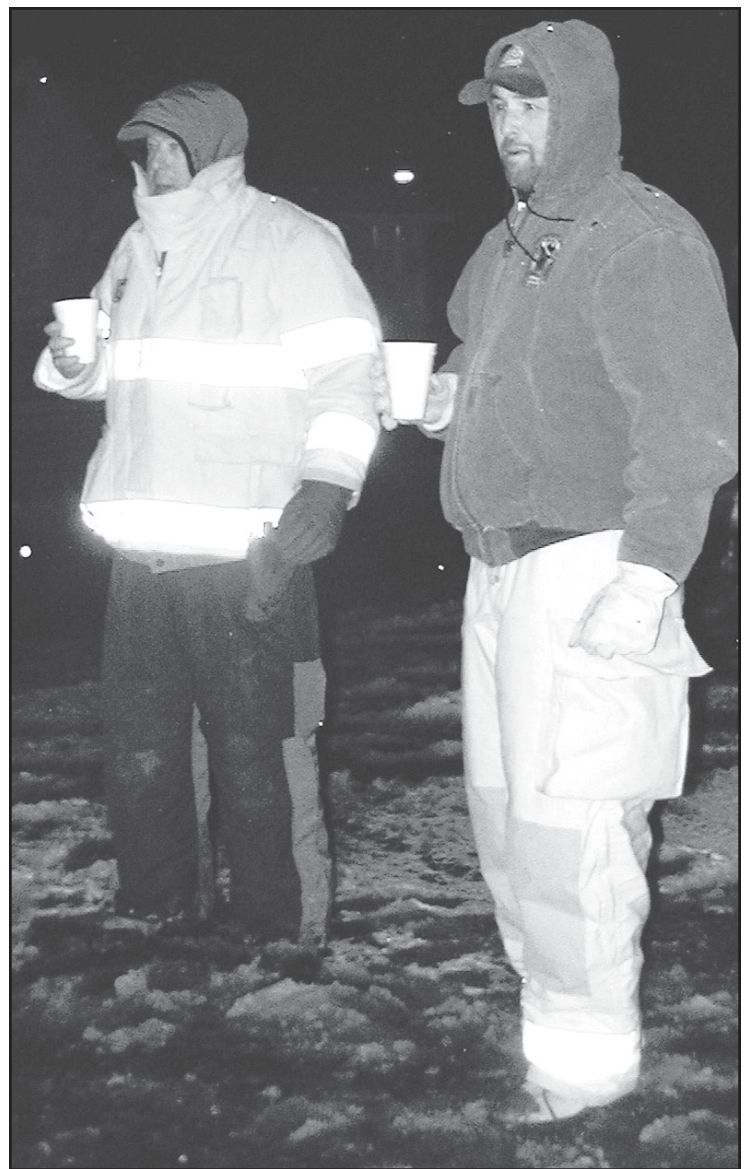
