Ladies defeated byHoxie

As this is a single elimination tournament, the 71-18 loss to Hoxie ended the season for St. Francis. Hoxie prevailed on Saturday night in the finals and qualified for the State tournament by being named substate champions.

The Hoxie Ladies been a dominating force in Northwest Kansas League basketball this season and they proved their power by outscoring St. Francis 27-2 in the first quarter. The Lady Indians were kept nearly scoreless the first three quarters of the game, entering the final period with only six points on the scoreboard.

"From coaching to playing, we were beat in every category," Coach Ted Busse said.

Neither team could take advantage of the three-point long ball with no attempts going through the hoop. Using the remainder of the field, Hoxie was 34-55 for a nice 61.8 percent and they added 3-of-7 shots from the free-throw line. The Lady Indians were 17.4 percent (8-of-46) from the field and 22.2 percent (2-of-9) from the

The 18 points St. Francis scored came from the efforts of seven players with Alecia Zimbelman and Sidnee Crabtree each having four.

Hoxie not only dominated the scoring but also pulled down 43 rebounds compared to 23 for the Lady Indians. Zimbelman led in this area also with a total of five. Turnovers were equal with both teams having 28, but Hoxie controlled the tempo of the game.
