Legislators talk about school finance

State school finance was the most talked about subject when legislators met in St. Francis early Saturday morning. There were 10 people

Sen. Ralph Ostmeyer, Rep. John Faber and Attorney General Phil Kline all talked about education and how small schools were going to survive on less money. Rep. Faber said that the House was proposing an increase of \$660 million over the next three years and Sen. Ostmeyer said the Senate was reviewing it. Much of the money will be funneled into "High At-Risk" programs. Base State Aid Per Pupil, Special Education funding and At-Risk Weighting will also increase.

Over three years, the measure would provide \$480 million in new state money to districts and would require districts to match that with \$180 million of local money.

Sen. Ostmeyer said that he doesn't think the plan will satisfy

"It is putting a ton of money in urban at-risk and the formula won't help us much," he said.

The legislators stressed that the proposed \$660 million increase would not be raised by increasing taxes. After all, this is an election year. However, in the larger counties such as Johnson County, they
