> Kansas passed a zero tolerance law for underage drinking and driving in 1997. the law makes it illegal for anyone under 21 to operate a motor vehicle with a blood alcohol contest of .02 or above. For individuals under 200 pounds bodyweight, just one drink leads to a count of .02.

> First offenders have their driving privileges suspended, then restricted for a more prolonged period. There can also be fines. Penalties are more severe for repeat offenders or for those with a count exceeding .08. Rates for auto insurance can double or even triple after an underage conviction.
