Primary set for Tuesday

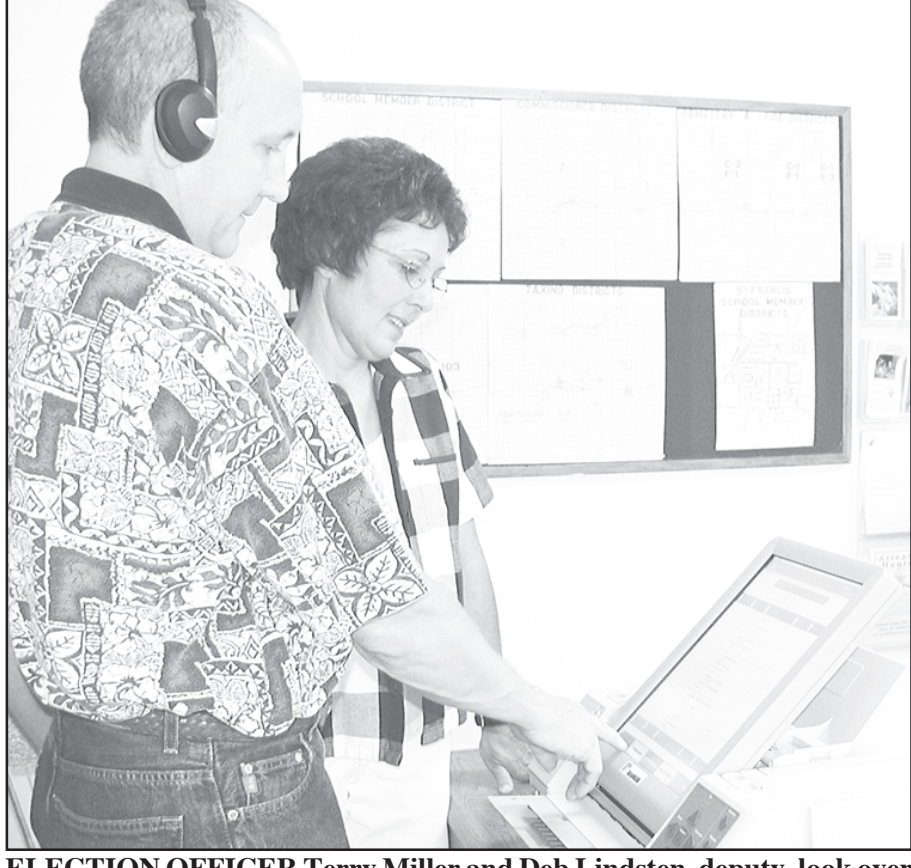

Cheyenne County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, and for the first time, will be able to vote on the new voting machines. It should be noted that there will also be the regular paper ballots and pencils available for those wanting to use those.

The polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Voting places in St. Francis include the Methodist Church for Wano II Township; Peace Lutheran Church for Wano I Township; and the courthouse for Benkelman, Calhoun, Cleveland Run, Jaqua and Orlando townships. In Bird City, all registered voters will go to the Bird city American Legion Hall.

The primary election will decide who gets their party's nomination for state and county offices. In Cheyenne County, there are two races involving local candidates. Connie Morris, St. Francis, is running against Sally Cauble, Liberal, for a seat on the Kansas State School Board, District 5. Gary Brubaker and Clayton Janicke are running on the same side of the ticket for county commissioner, District 1, Bird City. Winner of the race will face Ernie Ketzner, Democrat.

There are seven Republican candidates seeking a seat in the governor's race. The winner will meet Democrat Kathleen Sebelius in the general election. See PRIMARY on Page 9A

Voting machines are here

Voting technology has come to Cheyenne County. People will be able to cast their votes on a computer at the Aug. 1 primary election.

Terry Miller, county clerk and election officer, said there will be a computer voting machine available at each of the elec-

tion sites in the county for the primary election. However, he stressed that people do not have to use the computer — that there are also paper ballots available where people can fill in the circle. These ballots are much like those used in prior elections.

The Cheyenne County Fair activities will begin Monday with the 4-H'ers clothing and textile judging taking place in the morning and the Fashion Revue held at the Cheyenne Theater at 8 p.m. (See related article.)

Wednesday through Saturday evening, grandstand entertainment is planned including the Kid's Ranch Rodeo on Wednesday; Adult Ranch Rodeo on Thursday; the Baxter Black performance on Friday; and the demolition derby on Saturday.

The Amusement Authority carnival is also open Wednesday through Saturday evenings. The carnival is one of the best in the area and still offers rides for 25 cents and

50 cents. The games are fun and a person can play for a ticket — maybe two on some. However, the tokens they win can be traded for a huge stuffed dog or dinosaur to a necklace — it just depends on how many tokens are collected.

Each day of the fair, the food stands, manned by 4-H'ers, former 4-H'ers and their parents, are open. The stands offer a variety of sandwiches, drinks, pie and cake, just to name a few of the things.

At 9 a.m. on Tuesday, the 4-H dog show will begin in Jenkins hall. There will be some displays set up and it will be the last day to get projects finished, livestock See FAIR on Page 9A
