

Biker pedals over 12 hours to finish

A St. Francis man entered the Ride Across Indiana on July 15 and finished the 160-mile trip in 12 hours and 35 minutes.

Pete Montoya, St. Francis, has been riding his bike for over six years. He has entered numerous rides and almost always, the events have been in the raging heat. The temperature high in this one-day ride was 96 degrees.

Mr. Montoya said he drank a lot of water and Gatorade and there were stops every 40 minutes.

Two friends, who he has ridden with since the first Ride Across Kansas, accompanied him on the Indiana ride. They started at Terre Haute on Highway 40. They ended the trip at Richmond.

Mr. Montoya said the first 100 miles were enjoyable and he was able to see the scenery however, he saw mostly the pavement on the last 60 miles.

At 58 years, Mr. Montoya trains much of the year, starting in March. This year, his training included riding his bike to Goodland. Many may not know that the Montoya family lives in Kansas just south of Haigler. The hills on K-27 are like small mountains and his training might be more rigorous than most. Then add the hills between St. Francis and Goodland, it is a tough workout and a round trip of 130 miles. Mr. Montoya also had training trips to Wray.

Mr. Montoya started riding in the Williams Natural Gas ride in 2001. He manages the station which is now Southern Star Central Gas Pipeline.

He said that, as a kid, he didn't have a bike. But, he makes up for those years by spending a lot of his time riding today.

"I like to ride," he said. That has to be one reason he like to make the

Besides the Indiana and Kansas events, he has ridden in the Oklahoma, and Wisconsin rides. Montoya did not participate in rides in 2005. He plans to participate in the Ride Across Nebraska next year.

Colby tornado causes minor damage

The clouds hung over St. Francis most of the day on Monday and late in the afternoon, it began to rain. Again, the rain was spotty. St. Francis and Wheeler received moisture but, those living south and west of St. Francis didn't get any. Kathy Woodcox, St. Francis weather observer, reported .84 inch. There was also some pea-sized hail but not enough to do any damage.

Colby was not so lucky. A tornado hit about 6:50 p.m. near the intersection of I-70 and K-25.

The National Weather Service in Goodland reported the tornado produced minor structural damage to a motel and gas station in that area. Four people

were injured by flying debris or broken glass. The injuries, cuts and bruises, were described as minor.

A parked semi-truck was briefly lifted into another truck. The tornado was on the ground for approximately 10 minutes. Its path length was approximately five miles. As the tornado moved to the northwest it damaged vehicles at a car dealership and a number of highway signs.

The tornado dissipated in an open field approximately two miles west northwest of Colby. A storm assessment team from the National Weather Service office in Goodland, was dispatched shortly after the tornado occurred.

The team provided a rating of F1 on the Fujita scale for this tornado. The rating was based on damage done to a 45-foot sign supported by three I-beams, which had collapsed, plus other minor structural damage. An F1 tornado is considered weak, but can produce winds near 100 mph.

There was a 20-percent chance of thunderstorms on Tuesday and the high was around 95.

The rest of the week the forecast is to be hot with temperatures topping out in the mid to high 90s. No rain is in the forecast.

Colby country Club was not able to field a full team, but one of their participants, Scott Focke, shot a 70 for runnerup medalist honors. Focke fired a course-tying 30 on the front nine to tie the Sugar Hills record. Tyson Shelley of Goodland shot a par 71.

Other outstanding individual scores were Michael Terry of Atwood with a 73; Kevin Rollie of Atwood, Rollie Halligan of Goodland and John penny of Burlington, all with 74s. Dick Ahlberg of Oberlin, Jon McLean of Goodland and Kenny Rummel of Atwood all had 75s.

Hoxie could not field a full team, and Benkelman Country Club did not compete due to prior commitments.


