Ag Talk with Jeanne **Evaluation of ammonium sulfate**

State University Weed Science Program has been testing various ammonium sulfate (AMS) replacement products for use in glyphosate applications. Ammonium sulfate is an impor-

tant addition to glyphosate solutions before application in order to condition hard water and increase absorption by the target weeds. It is important to put the ammonium sulfate in the water before the addition of the herbi-

bind to these particles. As a result, there is more glyphosate readily available for weed control. In its dry form, ammonium sul-

fate works well and is relatively inexpensive, but it can be bulky to handle. Dry ammonium sulfate is added at the rate of 17 pounds per 100 gallons of solution. Liquid ammonium sulfate products are also available and the equivalent use rate is 5 gallons liquid ammonium sulfate per 100 gallons of

ammonium sulfate have performed equally well. In recent replacement products have en- trol with glyphosate alone. tered the market, according to Dallas Peterson, K-State Extension weed scientist. The main selling point of these products is they

have lower use rates than liquid ammonium sulfate and are easier to handle than dry ammonium sul-At K-State, we have compared

the performance of ammonium sulfate to several of these ammonium sulfate replacement products, using their recommended rates, with glyphosate. In these tests, ammonium sulfate dramatically improved weed control with glyphosate compared to glyphosate alone.
