# Wheat plot reported under stress

#### K-State Wheat Plot Results By: Jeanne Falk, Multi-**County Agronomist**

The wheat plot in Cheyenne County was under a great deal of stress this year. Even though these stresses played a major role in the low yield in the plots, we can still learn from these plots.

The wheat was planted into good moisture on Sept. 14. The wheat came out of the ground really well and had very lush growth in the fall.

This large amount of growth in the fall used a great deal of moisture and resulted in moisture stress during the remainder of the growing season. This was especially evident when comparing the plot yields to the yield of the surrounding field.

The surrounding field was planted the last week of September, did not have as much lush growth during the fall and yielded 30 bushels per acre. The average yield of the plots was 7.7 bushels per acre.

There was also a fair amount of unevenness in the plots. It was quite evident where the snow had drifted from the edge of the road into the plots. The wheat on the north edge of the plots was taller and generally in better condition than the wheat as you moved south through the plots. The surrounding field appeared to have more uniform wheat.

In addition to drought stress, there was freeze damage in the wheat plots. This would have also reduced the yield.

Since there was the difference in planting dates from the plots to the surrounding field, there was also a difference in the stage of development when the spring freeze injury

The plots were farther along in development and were more susceptible to freeze damage than the surrounding field. The amount of top growth also affected the freeze

hold the heat and prevent freeze damage. On average, there was 10 to 15 percent freeze damage, with a high of 20 to 25-percent damage in the plots. The surrounding field had little freeze damage.

Within the wheat plot, there was also a no-till vs. conventional tillage study. This study was not taken for yield, but there were differences in the emergence of the wheat.

The no-till wheat did not have the even uniform emergence seen in the conventional tillage wheat. In addition, these differences could be seen throughout the wheat season. There can also be differences in freeze damage between these tillage systems.

If there is a thick layer of residue on the soil surface, it can act as in-

damage. More top growth helps sulation and prevent heat from the many producers. They yield fairly soil radiating into the wheat canopy. With the poor yields and so many compounding factors, it is difficult to sort out any differences that might be evident between the tillage systems in these plots.

It is very hard to make recommendations for varieties based on the results from this wheat plot. There are some varieties that I am keeping an eye on, based on their performance in plots in the area.

Jagalene is a variety that seems to be suited to a number of environments. If you are thinking of white wheat, Danby is a wheat to watch. It stood up exceptionally well to drought stress and yielded well in plots in Sherman, Wallace, and Thomas counties.

well, but there are concerns with them. They are both susceptible to stripe rust. This disease was not a problem this last year, but will likely be a concern in the future.

If you plant these varieties and a severe infection of stripe rust enters our area, be ready to spray a fungicide to protect your wheat crop.

The top two varieties in the plot this year were Above and Infinity. These varieties are both Clearfield varieties, meaning they can be sprayed with the Beyond herbicide to help clean up weed problems.


