## Indians win49-0

The Indians sputtered early in the football game on Friday night but came away with a major victory. Moving their record to 4-1, St. Francis overcame early turnovers to post a decisive 49-0 win. Hoxie also recorded several fumbles during the

"There was some hard hitting and the ball popped out," Coach Tim Lambert said.

"We were a little lethargic at first but we settled down and played well. Hoxie came over ready to play."

The St. Francis/Hoxie game was the midpoint of the regular season, with the three district games appearing over the horizon. Sainty plays Quinter on Friday in Quinter and then begins the march to become one of two teams from District 14 to move into post-season play. St. Francis, Syracuse, Wichita County/Leoti and Rawlins County/ Atwood make up District 14.

"Quinter looks like a pretty good football team," Coach Lambert said. "Turnovers cost them a couple of games. If they play error-free football they will collect more wins. "It will be a good test for our kids, after the long bus ride."

The number of St. Francis passes surprised fans on Friday night. The offensive scoring included two touchdowns and one successful conversion play through the air. The team had 65 passing yards with quarterback Ted Crabtree completed four-of-five attempts. Receivers included AJ McAtee, Adam Peter and Joel McAtee. Josh Carpenter received the pass from reserve quarterback Trent Kinen for the after-touchdown completion.


