For the past few months, the St. Francis school has been working to develop a new website. Time was spent researching various possibilities to improve the school's website presence.

The new website is hosted on a server by The Foundation for Educational Services in Lincoln, Neb. The school is using a software program called Simplified Online Communication System (SOCS) to control the content of the site.

The URL for the new website is "http://www.usd297.org."

During the last few weeks, Kent Kechter, technology director for the school, has been training, experimenting and learning how to ad-

minister the site. Training has also been given to a few faculty members as well as administrators so that they can also have input into the site.

The new site is also a location for many helpful links such as the school calendar, PowerSchool, Kan-Ed, the school menu, activities, faculty/staff, student handbook, board minutes, photos, as well as other items.

"We plan to be continually adding information to the site, so it should be much more dynamic than the old site," Mr. Kechter said. "We hope you keep checking for new information, and we will do our best to keep the information relative and accurate."

"We hope you will visit the site and enjoy it. We would be happy to entertain suggestions and comments regarding the site."

"You will find links to do just that on the site. You might want to add a bookmark/favorite on your browser to make access easier."

The old website was housed on a server at the high school and was created using Microsoft FrontPage. The old site (http://www.usd297.k12.ks.us) has served the school well for several years and is still functioning today.

Present plans are to keep this old site updated for a while, but plans are to take the older website offline sometime in the future.
