The good news for hospital board members when they met on Thursday was the hospital and both the clinics in St. Francis and Bird City were being well used.

Hospital administrator Les Lacy said during November, the number of patients using the facilities was high with the exception of the last week. In October, there were 28 acute-care patients discharged from the hospital and that was a record for October with the next highest October being 18 in 2003. There were nine surgeries and four endo-

The lab was busy with a record of 2,234 procedures. The next highest October for the lab was 1,825 in 2004. There had been 102 CT scans, which Mr. Lacy said was "good" was the best for the year.

Outpatients at the hospital were also at a record high, both for the year and for the last five years of October. The statistics shows 1,968 patients. There were 1,751 outpatients in 2004 and during the year, there were 1,912 in August.

According to the on-line journal "Environmental Health Perspectives" approximately onethird of attention deficit cases among U.S. children may be linked with tobacco use by the mother while pregnant, or to lead exposure during infancy and childhood. The researchers analyzed data on nearly 4,000 U.S. children ages 4 to 15 who were part of a 1999-2002 government health survey. They asked whether mothers had smoked dur-

Children whose mothers smoked during pregnancy were 2.5 times more likely to have Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorderthan children who were not prenatally exposed to tobacco.

These findings build on previous research linking attention problems with childhood lead exposure and smoking during pregnancy. The findings are consistent with a National Academy of Sciences report in 2000 that said about 3 percent of all developmental and neurological disorders in American children are ing pregnancy, but used blood caused by toxic chemicals and other tests to determine lead exposure. environmental factors, and 25 per- Education Department
