Chat with Rosalie

Seniors' questions answered Q. What can seniors do to help their doctors avoid prescription drug interaction?

A. Keep a pencil copy of all your medication, vitamins, etcetera in your purse or wallet, listing the name of medication, how often taken (directions for use), milligrams per dosage. If your record is in pencil each time a dosage is change you can erase and keep your record current.

This record should also include your name, address, phone number, birthday, allergies, your doctor's name, pharmacy, Living Will, yes or no, if so, location, Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care, yes or no, and the name of the person in charge. Also include current medical conditions you are being treated for, any surgeries, type and the year. This is a long answer but could be very beneficial for your doctor, emergency medical technicians and so forth.

Q. What, and when, do seniors need to inform their children of their financial, long-term care, life insurance and other essential issues about aging.

A. Whenever the person thinks the time is right. Each family will, and should, set its own priorities. I have told my children where things are, but not given them written statements. That should also be done at the same time as the family talk is. Put everything in writing and give a copy to each child. If you have a computer you could also tell your children your information is on the computer and how you labeled the information. At the same time, a Power of Attorneys, a Living Will and a Durable Power of Attorney should be drawn up. There is a lot of information available on the Internet concerning these topics.

Q. Is there anything new concerning the Medicare Prescription Plan D Program?

A. On Sept. 30, the Wichita *Eagle* had a very informative article, "Medicare adds to drug plan options." Now there will be 53 plans in Kansas to choose from,

When a person receives their "2007 Medicare and You" booklet, all of the plans will be listed as this year, look them over very carefully, compare the plans with your current plan.

One person said "competition is working," but I think it may be more confusing. Many of the new plans are offering coverage that seniors have been asking for, such as no deductible or coverage in the so-called "doughnut hole."

The doughnut hole is the gap created at the point when beneficiaries have to pick up all of their drug costs.

"The new options that are available are primarily options that provide enhanced coverage," the article said. If seniors are not satisfied with their plans, they can switch to a new one during the open enrollment period. Read your "Medicare and You" booklet very carefully to check on the enrollment or change period.

A. Is there anything new concerning generic drugs?

A. Also from the Wichita Eagle on Sept. 30, a very interesting article on some popular drugs, "Does your drug have a generic?"

Wondering if a drug you take is available in a generic form? There were five new generic drugs listed: Zocor, Percocet, Zithromax, Zoloft and Flonase.

The Generic Pharmaceutical Association says the easiest way to find out (about generic drugs) is to ask your doctor or pharmacist. You also can use an online resource such as the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's "electronic orange book," which lists drugs, at www.fda.govcder/ob.

To use it, first search by brand name to find the active ingredient in the drug. Then search by the active ingredient: The generic drug manubrand name manufacturer.

For example, *The Eagle* looked up Zoloft, which is a medication for depression and anxiety. The Web site showed that the active ingredient is sertraline hydrochloride.

Bird City resident Terry Glasco addressed the City Council on Monday evening to ask for the relocation of the recycle bins. Other places to move the bins are being looked at.

 A 20-minute executive session was held to discuss the emergency building and personnel. No decisions were made after the executive session and the meeting was adjourned.


