100-year-old enjoys parade on birthday

Eva Deckman celebrated her 100th birthday by fulfilling a long held dream - to ride in a convertible. Representatives of the Colby Fire Department, Colby Police Department and staff from Lantern Park Manor escorted her on a parade through downtown Colby Saturday afternoon. Eva was also accompanied by her three grandsons. After the parade, she was honored at an open house with entertainment and refreshments at Lantern Park Manor, where she has lived since July 1996.

Mrs. Deckman was born Jan. 5, 1901, in a sod house at Palco. "That was all the style in those days," she said. "Later they had sod chicken houses.

She married her husband, Clarence "C.J." Deckman June 22, 1920. They met at a taffy pull at a neighborhood party. "We had lots of get-togethers and dances," she said. " My mom was happy when they came to our house, because she knew where we were and what we were doing."

Her parents, Melanie (Dussault) and Max Roberts played the violin for dances. Eva played the piano and organ and played for many dances when she was young.

"My father was born in Canada, and my mother was born in New Hampshire," she said. "They had to come to Kansas to meet each other.'

In 1928 Eva and C.J. moved to Wallace County, where he was the manager of a wheat farm with over 30 units in the 1920s and 1930s. Before moving to Wallace County, he had worked back and forth between Wallace County and Palco.

Eva said she was "just a housewife."

Her duties included gardening, raising chickens, canning, quilting, assisting her husband, and bearing four sons, only one of whom lived to grow up.

That son, Duane V. Deckman, died in 1978, but left three sons: Ronald who farms in Wallace County; Joseph who is a superintendent with the Kansas Highway Department in Hays; and Gerald who is an agronomist at Hugoton. There are also six greatgrandchildren. Eva's husband, C.J., died in 1969 after almost 50 years of marriage.

Eva said when she was young, she belonged to the Garden Club, and Altar Society, and helped serve food at many dances and sales.

She said she went to all the ball games when she was young. In the days before television, the neighbors got together and made up their good times, playing cards, dancing, play croquet and similar activities.

"I've had a good life," she said. "It was a happy one. I had good parents who looked after us.'

When asked how she had lived to be 100 years old, she said, "That is up to the good Lord.'

Mrs. Deckman enjoys reading the newspapers and keeping abreast of what is going on in the world. She reads the Colby, Salina and Wallace County newspapers and is able to get about with the aid of a walker.

Today's recipe requires a bit of time...but the results are well worth it.

Sirloin Pinto Bean Chili

1 pound sirloin, cut into 1/2 inch cubes Salt and pepper

2 (14.5 oz.) cans beef broth

1 large onion, chopped 2 (4 oz.) cans diced green chiles

2 cloves garlic, minced 2 cups water 1 pound pinto beans, cooked

1/2 teaspoon ground cumin 1 (16 oz.) can tomato sauce

Roux-(thickening) 8 ounces margarine 1 cup flour

Melt margarine and blend in flour. Place in small baking dish and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes; stirring every 10 minutes. Set aside. In heavy Dutch oven, sear sirloin with salt and pepper until well browned. Stir in broth to deglaze skillet. Add onions, chiles and garlic. Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer for 15 minutes; add beans, water, cumin and tomato sauce. Continue at a slow simmer for 1 to 2 hours. Add roux to achieve desired consistency. Simmer for an additional 30 minutes. Makes 8-10 servings.
