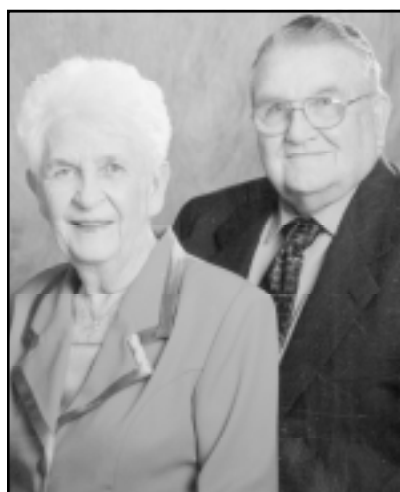


Celebrating 60 years

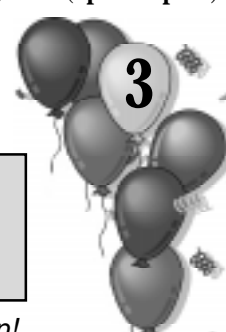
