NFL votes to reorganize

ROSEMONT, Ill. (AP)—The NFL unanimously approved realignment for 2002, shifting Seattle from the AFC to the NFC but keeping most of the divisions intact.

The move creates eight four-team divisions for the 32-team league that will include expansion Houston.

Under the new alignment, the AFC East will be Buffalo, Miami, New England and the New York Jets; the AFC South will be Houston, Indianapolis, Jacksonville and Tennessee; the AFC North will be Baltimore, Cincinnati, Cleveland and Pittsburgh; and the AFC West will be Denver, Kansas City, Oakland and San Diego.

The NFC East will be Dallas, the New York Giants, Philadelphia and Washington; the NFC North will be Chicago, Green Bay, Detroit and Minnesota; the NFC South will be Atlanta, Carolina, New Orleans and Tampa Bay; and the NFC West will be Arizona, St. Louis, San Francisco and Seattle.
