Officer Jim Engel of the Thomas County Sheriff's Department was the speaker for the National Association of Retired Federal Employees meeting Thursday night, June 21.

Engel talked about how easy it is to make methamphetamine and showed some of the items confiscated from various meth labs in the county. He said there are a lot of people making meth, and not enough officers to cope with it.

He said meth can be in rock, powder or liquid form, and users will snort, inhale, eat, shoot into their veins, absorb it into the skin, or use any other way to get it into their bodies.

The ingredients can be purchased at Wal-Mart, and those making meth often steal anhydrous ammonia from

He said landowners should report suspected meth labs to law enforcement, and not touch anything because they might get hurt, as well as destroying evidence.

It does not cost the landowner anything to clean up a meth lab. The federal government has a program to pay

He said Thomas County law enforcement prosecuted 10 sites in 1999, and sent some people to prison.
