Better Choose Me, a display of rare and delicate pieces of our tobacco past will be on display from July 20-Aug. 6, at the Hansen Museum Gallery in **Logan.** By 1880, the most popular tobacco product in the U.S. was the cigar. Cigars were produced in small cottage industries all over the country, and tied into bundles with bright ribbons. Ribbons were frequently printed with the cigar's brand name and collected by women who pieced them into table covers, pillow tops, and parlor throws. This exhibit is through the Kauffman Museum, Bethel College, North Newton. It will be in the Hansen Museum Gallery, along with Larry Hatteberg's Kansas People Photo Exhibit, from July 20-Aug. 6. Museum hours are 9 a.m.-noon and 1-4 Monday through Friday; 9 a.m.-noon and 1-5 p.m. Saturday, and 15-5 p.m. Sunday and holidays. Admission is free.
