#### Fred R. Rikoff

Fred B. Rikoff, 90, died July 12, 2001, in Wichita. He was a longtime area resident.

He was born to Frank Morris and Betty May (Sisson) Rikoff on Aug. 21, 1910, at their farm home about four miles west of Colby, the tenth child in

In 1920, Frank Rikoff and family moved to Hemming Ranch 20 miles northwest of Colby. While the family lived there Fred attended a rural oneroom school until consolidation. After consolidation, he rode a bus to Brewster where he finished grade school and Ralph Jones two years of high school. About the time Fred completed his schooling at Colby High in 1931, the Frank Rikoff erd . Burial was at Beulah Cemetery, family moved to a farm seven miles Colby. north of Colby where Fred farmed with his brothers.

On Aug. 1, 1934, Fred and La Verene E. Grover, Menlo, were married at the Methodist parsonage in Gem.
