George secured a job with the City of Colby, and worked there for the next 45 years. He retired in January 1992. George became well known in the community and owned a number of businesses.

Shortly after moving to Colby, George met and later married Armella Corwin. They were married for 42 years. After his retirement, George was afflicted with a stroke in 1997.
