Ripken hit his second pivotal homer in two games, a tiebreaking shot in the sixth inning that powered the Baltimore Orioles past the Kansas City Royals 5-4 Wednesday night.

He turns 41 later this month, but Ripken is hardly showing his age. He's hit safely in 40 of his last 44 games, amassing nine homers and 33 RBIs.

"I don't think anything he does should surprise anybody," Orioles manager Mike Hargrove said. "He's been doing it for so long. What he does should leave people in awe, but not in wonder.'

Ripken is a two-time MVP and a future Hall of Famer, so he's had streaks like this before. But what makes this run so amazing is that he was hitting .207 on June 19, the day he announced

that this would be his final season. "Right now, I feel extremely relaxed and I'm enjoying playing the game of baseball," he said. "When you are swinging well and seeing the ball well, the game becomes a little easier. But the fun comes from winning in the end, so the last two nights have been espe-

Chiefs' fullback is catching on

RIVER FALLS, Wis. (AP) — Kansas City fullback Tony Richardson said Wednesday that the Chiefs are just beginning to realize how explosive a Dick Vermeil-coached team can be, and it's just a matter of time before everything falls into place.

"I think the most important thing is when you start understanding how the offense fits in place and how you fit in," the 6-foot-1, 232-pound Richardson

"I think everyone has taken that approach, and it's obviously helped us."

Richardson, the team's starting fullback the last two seasons and leading rusher a year ago, has taken the lead in understanding where he fits into the Chiefs new offense.

He knows his role changed when the team signed Priest Holmes last April.
