

First 'brrr' of the fall season here

Free Press Publisher What's that stuff on the windshield? That was the question asked by some Colby motorists this morning as the community's official thermometer flirted around with the freezing mark.

That stuff on windshields, or the rear window in some cases, was a light treatment of frost, created when the early morning's dampness challenged the thermometer's 34 degrees. The thermometer won out.

The community's thermometer is located at the Northwest Research-Extension Center.

The 34 degrees was not a record for the date. That record belongs to 1989 when the mercury dropped to 29 de-

However, this morning's 34 degrees is the lowest reading so far this month. On two other occasions the temperatures was in the 30s — on the 9th at 38 degrees and on the 10th at 39 degrees.

Ironically, the National Weather Service forecast office at Goodland was talking about this very thing — frost just this past week. "Frost can form with temperatures in the 30s...," the weather people at Goodland advised.

Colby generally receives its first hard freeze around Oct. 20. A hard freeze is defined as a temperature below 30 degrees. With the mercury dropping to 34 today, can that hard freeze be very far away?

The forecast for Colby through most of the week calls for lows to be in the middle 40s — no where near the hard freeze requirement. Weather details are in today's

Lawsuit filed in recent gas price increases

TOPEKA (AP) — A lawsuit has been filed against a Leavenworth oil company accused of increasing fuel prices at three Topeka gas stations after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

Shawnee County district attorney Robert Hecht is seeking a \$5,000 civil penalty from Charles R. Wood Co. Inc. for each time it sold fuel at a raised price after the attacks.

Hecht said one of the three stations raised its price to \$4 per gallon of gasoline and the other two raised prices to \$2.49 per gallon.

Rumors of fuel shortages that circulated after hijacked planes crashed on the East Coast sent motorists rushing to gas stations to wait in long lines.

Modern square dancing uses all types of music whereas the old style used only country/western, swing, etc. Now they dance to all kinds of music — classical, Irish, songs from musi-

Dible said. Weather: No change expected

Clear skies, nighttime temperatures in the 40s, daytime temperatures in the middle 70s to near 80, light winds and little or no precipitation is the Colby region's forecast through Thursday, says the National Weather Service forecast center. Colby's weekend temperatures: 82 on Friday, 92 on Saturday and 65 on Sunday; lows, 49 on Saturday, 46 on Sunday and 34 this morning. Precipitation remains at 3.03 inches for the month. The soil temperature at the four-inch depth is averaging 69 degrees. The records for Sept. 24: 95 in 1979 and 29 in 1989. (The daily temperatures, precipitation and records are provided by the Northwest Kansas Research-Extension Center, Colby.)
