

# Eagles fall 27-7 to Hays

Colby Free Press The undefeated Hays High School Indians relied on a couple of big plays and a stifling defense to stop the Colby Eagles 27-7 Friday night at Colby's Dennen Field.

Hays, ranked in Class 5A coming in, was able to stop the Colby offense in the red zone, but only put seven points on the board in the first quarter themselves.

The touchdown came on a third and four at the Colby five yard line with 4:16 left in the first quarter.

The second quarter was a battle for field position by both teams, until Hays culminated a 53 yard drive with a 1-yard touchdown run with 53 seconds on the clock.
