Panthers down Colby

The Colby High School Eagle football team was able to keep their running game going in a 34-8 loss in Concordia on Friday night, but the difference was in the passing game.


The Eagles were only able to pass for 86 yards while Concordia went for 199 of their 366 total yards. Colby's running game was able to rack up 146 yards against 167 yards for Concordia.

Concordia scored first and led 6-0 in the first quarter. The Eagles outscored Concordia in the second on a Cade Moses pass reception followed by a 2point conversion by Ryan Arensdorf.

The half-time score was 13-8 Concordia, but the second half saw three unanswered Panther touchdowns before a scoreless fourth quarter.

Arensdorf was the leading rusher with 23 carries for 123 yards. Brent McCoy had seven carries for 18 yards and quarterback Jared Cranston scrambled fir nine yards on five carries. Adam Horinek also carried twice and was stopped behind the line of scrimmage both times.

Cranston was 7-for-25 in the air for 28 percent with one interception and 1 touchdown. Arensdorf was the main receiver with three catches for 23 yards. Moses had only one catch, but it was for 39 yards and a touchdown.
