

# Panthers down Colby

The Colby High School Eagle football team was able to keep their running game going in a 34-8 loss in Concordia on Friday night, but the difference was in the passing game.

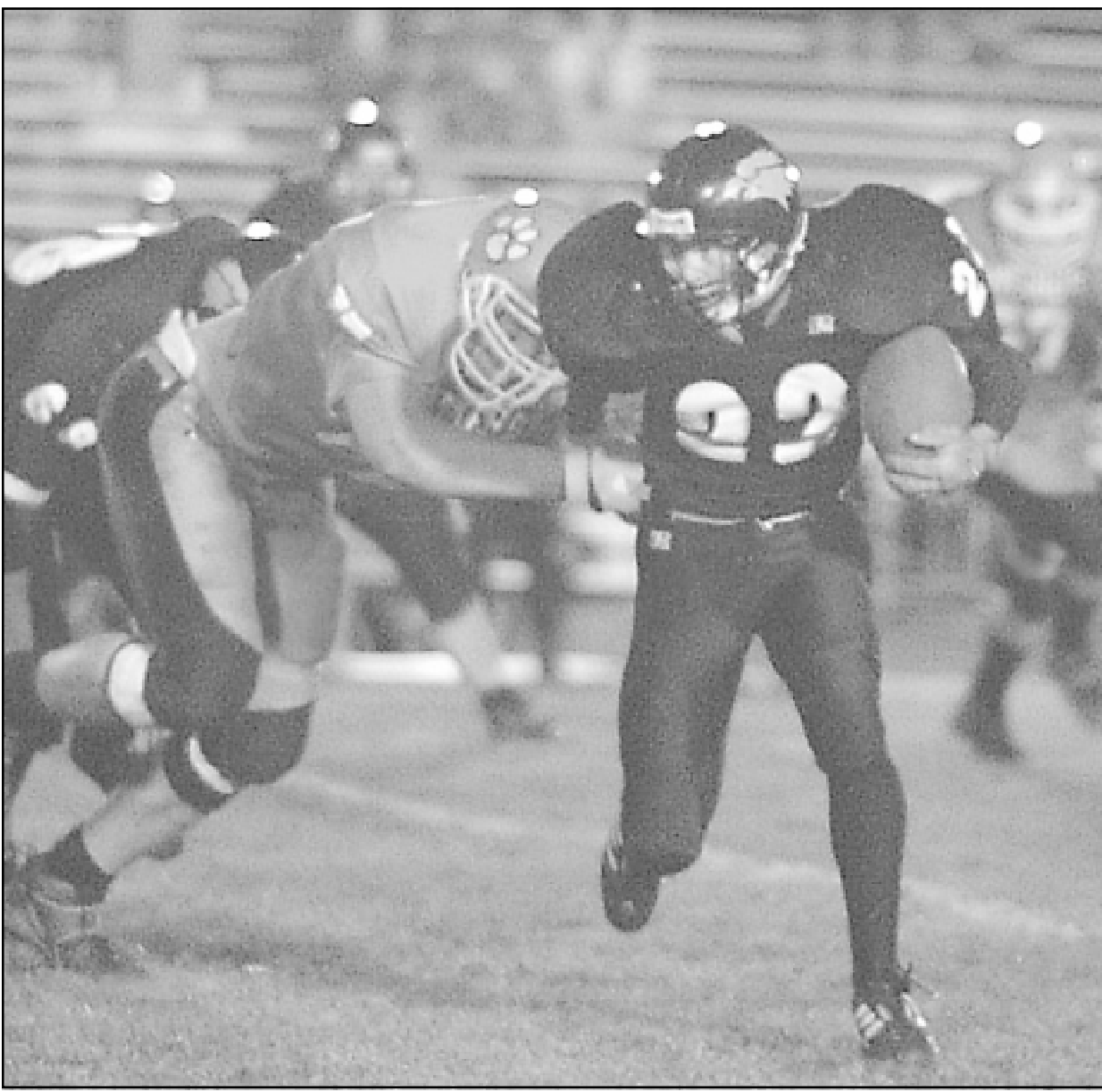
The Eagles were only able to pass for 86 yards while Concordia went for 199 of their 366 total yards. Colby's running game was able to rack up 146 yards against 167 yards for Concordia.

Concordia scored first and led 6-0 in the first quarter. The Eagles outscored Concordia in the second on a Cade Moses pass reception followed by a 2-point conversion by Ryan Arensdorf.

The half-time score was 13-8 Concordia, but the second half saw three unanswered Panther touchdowns before a scoreless fourth quarter.

Arensdorf was the leading rusher with 23 carries for 123 yards. Brent McCoy had seven carries for 18 yards and quarterback Jared Cranston scrambled for nine yards on five carries. Adam Horinek also carried twice and was stopped behind the line of scrimmage both times.

Cranston was 7-for-25 in the air for 28 percent with one interception and 1 touchdown. Arensdorf was the main receiver with three catches for 23 yards. Moses had only one catch, but it was for 39 yards and a touchdown. Jordan Harris had one for 12 yards, Jeff

Reavis one for eight yards and Ryan McLemore one for four yards. Jordan Harris had six tackles. Brent Diebert, Schuyler Sharpe and Cade Moses had four tackles each. Eric

Seemann and Arensdorf had three each. Reavis, McLemore and Nic Schroeder had two, and Tanner Brown, Troy Bielser, Brett Dempewolf and Cranston had one each.

Sharpe had an interception and Bielser recovered a fumble in the effort.

# Jayhawks need two overtimes for win

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP)—A couple of freshmen got the job done for the Kansas Jayhawks.

Johnny Beck kicked his fourth field goal in the second overtime and Mario Kinsey came off the bench to lead the comeback as Kansas rallied to a 34-31 victory over Texas Tech Saturday night.

"This is what I live for, I live for the big-time situations like this so we can make the play and I can hush everybody up," Kinsey said. "It just feels good to beat Texas Tech at their homecoming."

Trailing 24-13 in the third quarter, the Jayhawks (2-2, 1-1 Big 12) rallied with two scores in a span of 4:11 to send the game into overtime.

Beck kicked a 44-yard field goal and Kinsey threw a 5-yard touchdown pass to Termaine Fulton. Reggie Duncan's run for the 2-point conversion tied the game at 24.

"They just hung in there. They didn't lose it on the sideline," Kansas coach Terry Allen said.

"There were a lot of personal fouls

in the game on both sides of the ball that were pretty costly. It is kind of special the way they hung in there through this process, because God only knows that we needed this win."

Kinsey put Kansas ahead in the first overtime with a 9-yard pass for a 31-24 lead.

But the Red Raiders (2-2, 0-2) tied it on a 9-yard quarterback draw by B.J. Symons, who entered in the fourth quarter after starter Kliff Kingsbury sprained his right thumb.

Beck then kicked a 37-yard field goal for the go-ahead points and Marcus Rogers secured the victory for the Jayhawks by intercepting Symons' pass on Tech's second overtime possession.

"I tried to help the offense run, but I made a mistake," Symons said. "I'm still learning, and it will make me a

better player."

Beck is 9-for-10 on field-goal attempts this season.

His only miss came on a 48-yard attempt that hit the left upright in the fourth quarter.

Kingsbury pulled Tech back from a 10-0 deficit to a 17-13 half-time lead with touchdown passes of 3 yards to Cole Roberts with 30 seconds left in the first quarter and 35 yards to Wes Welker early in the second quarter.

Kingsbury's third touchdown pass came with 3:26 to go in the third quarter, a 24-yard screen pass to Ricky Williams, giving the Raiders a 24-13 lead.

Robert Treece kicked a 27-yard field goal for Kansas with 4:55 left in the first half and Beck kicked a 42-yarder with 1:57 to go.

The Jayhawks drove 78 yards on the first drive of the game and scored on Zach Dyer's 1-yard pass to Austine

Nwabuisi.

Reggie Duncan's 45-yard run to the Tech 25 was the big gainer.

Moments later, Carl Ivey blocked a Tech field goal attempt and Andrew Davidson ran it back 36 yards to the Tech 34 setting up Beck's 42-yard field goal.

Middle linebacker Lawrence Flugence, the Red Raiders' leading tackler, sprain his knee in the first quarter and did not return.

"I thought we played hard and made some good plays," Tech coach Mike Leach said. "Kansas gave Colorado a good game. We were in the position to win, but we came up short. The biggest thing is that our self-esteem needs to go up and get a lot better."

Duncan rushed for 227 yards on 38 carries.

"We challenged our linemen before the game and we told them if you can get Reggie 100, something good will happen for you all," Kinsey said. "We didn't tell them what but we told them something good would happen for them next week, so we owe them one."



# Fort Scott pulls off shocker in Garden City

FORT SCOTT — First-year Coach Kevin Verdugo hasn't been around the Jayhawk Community College Conference very long, but he knows which teams get the national attention.

His Greyhounds weren't on that list — until Saturday night.

Fort Scott, which has not had a winning season since 1992 and has had four coaches in the last decade, upset

Garden City — the National Junior College Athletic Association's top-ranked team — 24-17.

"I told our players all week that we could win this game and I meant it," Verdugo said.

"We want to raise our level of play each game and get our team noticed," he said.

In other Jayhawk games on Saturday, Butler County beat Hutchinson 43-10 and Coffeyville defeated Highland, 45-21. In a nonconference game, Dodge City beat Air Force Prep 28-27.

Fort Scott set the tone of Saturday's game early, bolting to a 10-0 lead after one quarter.

Quarterback Bill Whittemore completed 20-of-40 passes, including three touchdown throws, for 304 of Fort Scott's 449 yards of offense.

Wide receiver James Taylor caught two of Whittemore's TD passes, from 24 yards in the first quarter and 37 yards in the fourth period, and finished with nine catches for 182 yards.

Garden City didn't help its cause any by fumbling six times.

"Our offense put our defense in some horrendous situations in the first half, but their quarterback made some things happen," said Garden City coach Bob Larson. "Tonight they played like champions."

# K-State 'self-destructs' against underdogs

MANHATTAN (AP) — Bill Snyder, who says his target is always to have Kansas State get better each day, should have no problem this week with reaching his goal.

The Wildcats could hardly get worse.

Colorado, unranked and largely unappreciated, came to town as a 10-point underdog and whipped the No. 12 Wildcats in just about every possible way.

To say the Buffs' 16-6 victory snapped Kansas State's home winning streak against unranked teams at 58 in a row is very deceptive. The Buffs (4-1, 2-0 Big 12) were obviously unfairly disregarded after a two-point loss to then-unranked and now No. 10 Fresno State.

They're disregarded no more, particularly by the Wildcats (2-2, 0-2).

"They are an under-ranked team and deserve a lot more respect than what they get," said Kansas State defensive back Terence Newman.

While Kansas State kept self-destructing — to use Snyder's term — the Buffs were sacking quarterback Ell

Roberson six times and intercepting him twice.

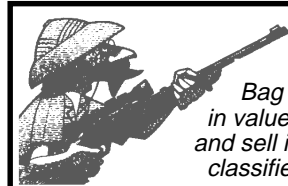
