

Melvin Lester Barrett

Melvin Lester Barrett died at Hays Medical Center in Hays following a brief illness. He was a farmer, teacher, civic leader, and long-time area resident.

He was born Dec. 19, 1918, in the rural Dodge City area, the son of Lena Dena (Hahne) and Thomas Martin Barrett. Lester attended school in Dodge City and graduated with the class of 1935 from Dodge City High School. He was an Eagle Scout.

Lester attended college at what is now Kansas State University, majoring in music education. There he met his soon-to-be-bride Clara Isabel Schnellbacher of Colby. They were married on June 4, 1941, just after Lester graduated with a bachelor of arts degree. The couple then moved to Iowa City, Iowa, where Lester attended summer graduate school at the University

Lester taught instrumental music first in Brewster, then in Atwood. He was drafted into the Army in 1944 in the Field Artillery and attended Officer Candidate School in Ft. Sill, Okla. After 90 days in officer training school he was sent overseas as a member of the 43rd Signal Heavy Construction Battalion, building communication lines in France. Lester was honorably discharged from the Army as a major.

Upon returning to Kansas, Lester

began farming with his father-in-law Claude Schnellbacher and his brotherin-law Albert Frahm near Colby. Lester enjoyed working in partnership with his son-in-law Mike Brown for the last 25 years.

Lester and Clara had four daughters. Lester always took time to read two or three chapters from a good book to his girls. Every year there was a trek to the mountains of Colorado to camp. He helped his daughters learn to play piano, violin, and cello, along with a good understanding of music theory. One of Lester's greatest joys in recent years was being "Papa" to eight grandchildren. Even the "grand dogs" held a special place.

Lester was the choir director at the Colby Methodist Church for 30 years. He was the soloist at many funerals.

Lester was also involved in many civic organizations. He was a Paul Harris Fellow and a long time member of Rotary Club. He supported Colby Community College especially the Livestock Judging Team, and the Horse Production Program. In 1992 Lester given an honorary degree from Colby Community College.

Lester was instrumental in helping to build Citizen Medical Center. He was one of the original incorporators of the Thomas County Hospital Association serving on the Board of Trustees from 1979-1982

Lester is survived by his wife Clara Barrett of Colby; daughters Sherry Barrett of Colby, Jeanene Brown and husband Mike of Colby and children, Nancy Walker and husband Lynn of Valley Center and children, and Beverly Jensen and her husband Alan Kersenbrock Funeral Chapel, Colby.


